
STEADY NORTHERLY KEEPS THE FLEET ON THE MOVE

A bobby-dazzler day for Razzle Dazzle
Wednesday Wonders Race 20 Summer Series 2016-17
(22 Feb 2017)



This race was the debut of the 7 leg, 9.8 nautical mile Course 24. It runs in an anticlockwise direction and in a northerly breeze about 46% of the rhumb line length is sailed as a beat, 39% becomes a run whist the remainder is a reach. In a 21 knot northerly it was one of the faster races of the series that saw 29 yachts start and 28 yachts finish. It was a successful race for the Swarbrick 111 RAZZLE DAZZLE (Andrew Stopp). She recorded her first win of the series when she crossed the finish line at 15:36:43 making this the 3rd earliest finish of the series. BABYDOLL (Brendan Kruger) crossed the finish line in 2nd place for the 2nd week in succession. HOT CHIPPS collected a 3rd place for the 3rd time this series.

It was the first Start of the Day win for SECOND NATURE (Paul Mentiplay) when she started the race 2 seconds late for her 34 minute handicap. The 2nd best start of the day was made by SALTWHISTLE (Alex Hall). NUTCRACKER II sailed the course in the fastest elapsed time of 1:22:34. ESPRIT (Garry Anderson) recorded the 2nd fastest time of the race with CARPE DIEM (Paul Commins) the 3rd fastest.



DÉJÀ VU (Peter Dransfield) retains top spot in the series aggregate with a total of 62 points. HOT CHIPPS enters the aggregate top ten for the first time this series in 7th place whilst PIPPA (Jeffrey Woolhouse) re-enters the top ten in 9th place. Slipping out of the top ten are MIDNIGHT MAGIC (Bernadette Moore) and THE SECRETARY (George Shaw).




RAZZLE DAZZLE made her WW debut in race 7 held on the 16 Nov 2017. She started that race with a handicap of 42 minutes and finished 29th in a fleet of 38 yachts. Her handicap was reduced to 30 minutes for race 8 was it has remained. She has now sailed 12 races and claimed 5 top ten finishes with the win in this race her first podium finish. RAZZLE DAZZLE started race 20 from 14th place 42 seconds late for her 30 minute handicap. At 15:03:27 she rounded number 4 for the first time in 4th place – 2 minutes 23 seconds behind the leader. She sailed the last 3 legs of the course in 33 minutes 16 seconds and was first across finish line at 15:36:43. RAZZLE DAZZLE had sailed the course in 1:36:43 - the 10th fastest time of the race. When she began this series she was 45th in the aggregate but she has gradually improved her position and currently shares 20th place with 100 points.

At the start of this race BABYDOLL had one podium finish. By the end, she had made it two. She started from 18th place 16 seconds late for her 35 minute handicap. By the first rounding of number 4 she was in 5th, 5 minutes 42 seconds behind the race leader but 4 minutes 34 seconds ahead of SECOND NATURE (Paul Mentiplay) who had stated over 1 minute sooner. BABYDOLL sailed the last 3 legs of the race in 32 minutes 35 seconds and crossed the finish line at 15:37:47 in 2nd place. She had sailed the course in 1:32:47 – the 8th fastest time of the race – finishing 1 minute 4 seconds behind the winner. These last two podium finishes have taken BABYDOLL from 28th to 19th and now 14th place in the aggregate with a total of 87 points.






This was the third time in 14 races that HOT CHIPPS has finished a race in 3rd place. She has collected 6 top ten finishes including 4 podium finishes. She started the series with a 37-minute handicap that by race 12 had become 31 minutes. By race 14 it was 14 minutes and has remained there since that race. HOT CHIPPS started this race from 15th place 36 seconds late for her 32 minute handicap, exactly the same time as MELTEMI SYC (Ian Howarth). After completion of the first 4 legs she was in 9th place, three places and a mere 27 seconds ahead of MELTEMI. The final three legs saw HOT CHIPPS move up a further 6 places to finish 3rd, 2 minutes 54 seconds behind BABYDOLL. HOT CHIPPS sailed the entire course in 1:38:41 and crossed the finish line at 15:40:41 – 2 minutes 10 seconds and 2 places ahead of MELTEMI. HOT CHIPPS is currently placed 7th in the aggregate on 75 points just 13 behind the leader with 5 races remaining.





In general, northerly starts have not been as good as southerlies but this was one of the better ones. Seven yachts started within 10 seconds or less of their handicaps whilst only one yacht was more than a minute late. The median start time was 18 seconds a little more than 2 seconds above the median for the series. SECOND NATURE won Start of the Day becoming the 13th winner in 18 races.

Some sailors were surprized when Foggy Dew was award the free Hull Scrub donated by BLAIR . Mark would like to rmind you that a yacht can only win one hull scub per season. AS the seaoson progress the awarding of the hull scrub slips down the time. In this are for wxamle the folling yachts started well but had all raedy been awarde Hull scrubs MW



The 29 yacht fleet started 53 minutes 38 seconds apart and this gap had reduced to 18 minutes 12 seconds at the first rounding of number 4. The gap between the 28 finishers was 16 minutes 31 seconds. On average a yacht crossed the finish line every 34 seconds and 18 yachts finished within 10 minutes of the winner. The closest finish was for 14th place with MOANA (Stan Rankin) finishing 2 seconds ahead of WINDSPEED (Les Browne).





It was the mid fleet starters who made up the majority (5) of the first 10 yachts across the finish line. ESPRIT (Garry Anderson) was the best of the late starters when she crossed the line in 8th place. Of the 10 early starters DEJA VU (Peter Dransfield) recorded the best result finishing in 6th place.

Note that Esprit was 22seconds SLOWER than Nutcracker but started 21seconds LATE- MW

The median elapsed time was 1:42:45 making this one of the faster races of the series. For the 8th time it was NUTCRACKER II (Rob Davis & Andy Baker) that had the fastest elapsed time – 22 seconds better than ESPRIT and 4 minutes 44 seconds faster than CARPE DIEM. There were three yachts, FIREFOX (Kim Beveridge & Howard Davis), SALT WHISTLE (Alex Hall) and BON VIVANT (Russell Keays) that sailed the course within 26 seconds of each other. Their handicaps were 25, 24 and 25 seconds respectively.



The chart to the left indicates the performance of each yacht in race 20 compared to its own performance throughout the current series. It does not indicate that a yacht performed better than the one beneath it or worse than the one above. If the yacht as a negative value (the bar extends to port) then the yacht has performed better in this race than throughout the series so far. If the bar has a positive value (extends to starboard) then the yacht has not matched its own performance throughout the series.

This race was also the 5th race in the Century Class Series. There were 8 contestants from a total of 10 yachts in the series. RAZZLE DAZZLE was the winner. She finished 6 minutes 56 seconds ahead of PIPPA with CASSANDRA of MELBOURNE in third place. There is only one race left in this summer series scheduled for 29th March 2017.

A EST Timely Reminder

When daylight saving time stops, the finish time gets shorter.

Races held in AEST(i.e. Non DST) will finish at 16:30 with a 30 min extension if one yacht finishes within the time limit.

The Two Hour Club

Three yachts became members of the 'Two Hour Club'. They started 1st, 2nd and 5th. This is despite Pippa averaging 6knts for the race and with a top speed of 6.9knts. Maybe it is the lack of pointing ability and sailing a course of 11.7nm that adds on time? Perhaps the yachtsman that remained in the bar should be included in the 'Two hour club'.

It is not often that skippers complain about their yacht being considered to be the fastest yacht in the race. However the skipper of one yacht, whose crew make up the "BAY 13" mob in the bar after the races has complained to MARK.

His claim was that in race 19 as Nutcracker started early, his time was recorded with the penalty of 5 minutes included. This made it look like Esprit was the fastest yacht around the course. Esprit 1:22:32 compared to Nutcracker 1:24:56.

I think Garry, on Esprit, must be nervous that the ANDY Capper might notice this 1min 24sec difference and increase his handicap. Nutcracker did actually go around the course at a faster speed. Rob however was over early by 2 seconds and was penalized 5 mins. This dropped Nutcracker from a 15 place to 26th.

The elapsed time used in the charts is a direct download from the SYC site. These times are not simply the actual start time minus the actual finish time of the yachts. The start time used is the race start (13:30:00) plus the yacht handicap, which is then subtracted from the actual finish time.

E.g. Race start 13:30:00 plus handicap, say 10 minutes makes a start of 13:40:00 subtracted from a finish time of say 15:40:00 gives an elapsed time of 2 hours.

If the yacht started a minute or less too soon then an additional 5 minutes is added to the elapsed time.

The ruling states that if a yacht is over early then 5 mins will be added to that yacht's time, so in fact the official time stated in the race report was correct. The handicaps for both these yachts have reminded the same.

The positive thing about the discussion is that the ESPRIT skipper reads the race reports and is well informed. No wonder he sails so well.

Start of the day Prizes.

One provided by the Tower Crew of a bottle of fizzy drink for the best start closest to the yacht's handicap time. The second prize of a hull scrub for every race is provided by Michael BLAIR. There is a restriction on this prize that a yacht can only be presented with the prize once a season. Some comments were made about a time of 13 seconds for Foggy Dew winning the Michael BLAIR hull scrub in race 20.

The following is a list of the best start times. All the yachts listed have previously won a hull scrub and were not eligible. At the end of the season it does become a little easier to get a hull scrub.

Sandringham Tower.... After the race is over, after the tower is closed down....all is not quiet. The Boating Department operates channel 77 when the tower is vacated and will respond to calls.

Andrew on Razzle Dazzle who discovered a leak after the race when he docked appreciated this. The Boating Department was able to assist and his yacht was out of the water before he could collect his two first prizes - one for coming first, and his first Century Class prize.

The weather. One skipper was heard to say "if I knew the tower was going to check the wind report twice I might have gone out." Yep they did phone in to the BOM well before the race and again for an update just before the start, as is their usual practice in strong winds.

In a strong Northerly, where is the best place to hold a race?

The BOM offered advice to the tower that if the race was going to be held it would be better in these conditions to conduct it close to the shore. Our courses are all tied to a tower finish so are limited in where they can be held.

From Mark's experience and in discussion with James Sly (who was also sailing on Wednesday), we were of the opinion that the wind further out was an easier place to be. The wind may be a little stronger but it does not seem to be subject to large shifts in direction. Those who watched the start of the race would have wondered why the first and second yachts that are the same class sailed a course of 30° difference. It was a costly wind shift that wiped out the first yacht's handicap.

Quality of VHF broadcast by the BOM (Coast Radio Melbourne)

The weather summary broadcast by Coast Radio Melbourne, at 12.48, on Channel 67 before the race was hardly audible. The tower and other yachts had this problem. On Mark Windward's request, the Boating Department are going to give the BOM feedback about the poor quality of their transmissions. Lets hope this service improves.

The quote from last week was by C J Denis (see last week's report).

There are many ways of judging the speed of a ship: by knots, by day's runs, by port-to-port records. Talking about boat speed: A sailing vessel held a speed record for 130 years when it was broken by a multihull, and it was not until 2001 that a monohulled boat broke this record. What was the name of the boat?
