# Long Race around a Shortened Course

Wednesday Wonders Race 3 Summer Series 2016 -7 (19 Oct 2016)




This was arguably the most intriguing Wednesday race for quite some time. It was the first time course 22 had been sailed; it took 20% longer to sail this course which was 43% shorter than the course sailed in race 2; the breeze shifted noticeably in strength and direction as the afternoon progressed; and the 33 yacht fleet finished further apart than when they started. Only one yacht finished within 10 minutes of the winner as a long thin line of yachts made their way slowly to the finish line.

The fading breeze, which averaged 6 knots at Fawkner Beacon, caused the 7 leg, 9.1 nautical mile course to be shortened to a 4 leg 5.6 nautical mile course. The breeze which came from the south west at the start of the race came from the east south east at the finish. This made the point of sail to some marks different for some yachts depending on their start time.

INSX (Rob Sill) made a great start to her summer series winning start of the day with a perfect start and going on to finish in 3<sup>rd</sup> place after sailing the course in the 2<sup>nd</sup> fastest elapsed time of the race. SALTSHAKER (Ken Gayler) also had a great start to her series being first across the finish line 8 minutes 14 seconds ahead of the rest of the fleet. Second across the line was MAGIC (Phil Spry Bailey) who sailed the course a mere 46 seconds faster than SALTSHAKER.

The averaged elapsed time was a little above 2 hours at 2:02:09, with the fastest elapsed time of 1:40: 48 recorded by CARPE DIEM (Paul Commins).





SALTSHAKER completed 17 of the 19 races in the winter series finishing 7<sup>th</sup> in the aggregate helped by a win in race 25. After finishing race 2 with a DNF she started this series with a comprehensive win.

SALTSHAKER started from 3<sup>rd</sup> place 21 seconds late for her 19 minute handicap. She sailed the shortened course in 1:52:43 and was first across the finish line at 15:41:43. SALTSHAKER started only 2 minutes 40 seconds and 1 place ahead of FOGGY DEW (Frank Hilliard) but, by the end of the race SALTSHAKER was 38 minutes 23 seconds ahead of FOGGY DEW and 8 minutes 14 seconds ahead of her closest rival. She starts the series tied for first place in the aggregate.


With a total of 2 points and in a tie for 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the aggregate is the S&S 39 MAGIC. MAGIC started the race from 8<sup>th</sup> place 43 seconds late for her 28 minute handicap. She was in 2<sup>nd</sup> place rounding number 1and was able to maintain a good lead over her rivals on the final leg of the race. MAGIC sailed the course in 1:51:57 and crossed the finish line at 15:49:57 – 5 minutes 6 seconds ahead of INSX. MAGIC started 3 seconds ahead of DÉJÀ VU (Peter Dransfield) but managed to finish 4 places and 7 minutes in front of her. MAGIC finished in the top ten of the winter series helped by a good result in the last race. She has had a good start to the summer.






INSX sailed only 7 races in the winter series after winning the Misty Blue Trophy (best starter) in the 2015-16 summer series. It did not take her long to regain her prowess by starting this series right on her handicap of 44 minutes. She started from 22<sup>nd</sup> place and was the best starter of 4 yachts


She started from 22<sup>nd</sup> place and was the best starter of 4 yachts each with a 44 minute handicap. She sailed the course in 1:41:03 the 2<sup>nd</sup> fastest time of the race which was 8 minutes 7 seconds faster than her closest rival from the 44 minute handicap group. INSX is tied with FOGGY DEW on 3 points in the aggregate.



As mentioned earlier INSX won Start of the Day with a perfect start. The next best start was recorded by BLUE TACK (Andy Lynch) who repeated her performance of race 2 by starting 1 second late. The third best start was recorded by the Misty Blue Trophy winner of the winter series – THE SECRETARY (George Shaw). The median start time was 27 seconds with 8 yachts starting within 10 seconds of their handicaps and 8 yachts starting more than a minute late.

The 33 yacht fleet started the race 54 minutes apart and finished 62 minutes 22 seconds apart. By not taking into account the first 2 and last 2 yachts across the finish line the gap becomes 29 minutes 11 seconds. The closest finish was between BLUE TACK and DÉJÀ VU who finished 2 seconds apart in 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> place.






On average each yacht finished 15 places away from its start position. DOLPHIN PLAY (John Brennan) dropped 32 places whilst MIDNIGHT MAGIC (Bernadette MOORE) dropped 30 places. In the meantime WINDSPEED (Les Browne), WICKED (Mike Welsh) and CARPE DIEM (Paul Commins) each finished 20 places ahead of where they started.

The average elapsed time for this race was 2:02:09 – the slowest since race 2 in the winter series. CARPE DIEM recorded the fastest time 1:40:48 with only 22 seconds separating the 4fastest yachts. At the opposite end of the scale yachts managed a sail of over 3 hours, something that was not recorded in the entire series.


