
Champagne Racing WW Summer Series 2016-17 Race 7 (16 Nov 2016)



"Champagne sailing conditions" greeted the 39 yachts that assembled for race 7 for what was the largest fleet of the series. It was the first WW race for a yacht new to SYC - RAZZLE DAZZLE (Andrew Stopp). Unfortunately she started 2 seconds too soon, was penalised 5 minutes and dropped 5 places. The race was around the same course as the previous week – the 6 leg 9.8 nautical mile course 13 – but there was a different outcome. This was a race of contrasting fortunes – some good others not so good. Of the four yachts allocated a 21 minute handicap, BON VIVANT (Russell Keayes) finished first and CARRERA (Geoffrey Simpson) finished 2nd. LEBROK (Theo Korbel) was the third of the podium finishers. The other two yachts with a 21 minute handicap MARIBEL (Graham Frazer) and MOANA found the race more challenging and crossed the finish line in 25th and 38th place respectively.

Start of the Day was won by BARNSTORMER (Brian Barnes) who was only 1 second late for her handicap. She is the 7th different winner this series. In contrast, last week's winner SALT WHISTLE (Alex Hall) started more than 2 minutes too soon and recorded DNS. This was unfortunate as she sailed a good race and would have been the 9th yacht across the finish line.

For the third successive week NUTCRACKER II recorded the fastest elapsed time of the race with a time of 1:39:53 - 27 minutes 22 seconds shorter than the average elapsed time. She finished in 12^{th} place following a 17^{th} in the previous race.



Fawkner Beacon observations indicated the breeze increased as the afternoon progressing from around 7 knots at the start to about 14 knots at the finish. The average was a 10 knot southerly. This is less than the 14.6 knot average for the series so far. Consequently this race enjoyed the longest average elapsed time of the series.



BON VIVANT has completed 3 races so far and improved her result in each race. She finished 34^{th} in race 5; 7^{th} in race 6 and a 1^{st} in this race. Her handicap has remained on 21 minutes for each race. She started this race from 5^{th} place 5 seconds late for her 21 minute handicap. Hers was the best start of the 4 yachts with 21 minute handicaps. It took 1:23:40 for BON VIVANT to sail the first 3 legs of the course. She rounded number 4 for the first time in 2^{nd} place – 1 minute 25 seconds behind the leader. BON VIVANT sailed the entire course in 2:06:30 faster than any of the other yachts with a 21 minute handicap. She crossed the finish line at 15:57:30 – 3 minutes 54 seconds ahead of CARRERA. BON VIVANT is now 25^{th} in the aggregate, up from 35^{th} place.

CARRERA made it two 2nd places in successive races when she crossed the finish line at 16:01:24. She started in 6th place 18 seconds late for her 21 minute handicap. That was 13 seconds after BON VIVANT. CARRERA was in 4th place after the first 3 legs of the race, already 3 minutes 42 seconds astern of BON VIVANT. CARRERA sailed the final 3 legs in 42 minutes 39 seconds overtaking two yachts along the way. In three races CARRERA has recorded a 6th and two 2nd places. These results put CARRERA in 3rd place in the aggregate with a total of 10 points. She was in 25th place following race 6.





The Beneteau 367 LEBROK is one of 13 yachts that have completed 5 races this series and this was her first podium finish. She had a good start only 3 seconds late for her 39 minute handicap from 25th place. She sailed the first 3 legs of the course in 1:15:59 and moved into 10th place at the first rounding of number 4.LEBROK sailed the last 3 legs of the course in 37 minutes 22 seconds, crossing the line at 16:02:24. LEBROK started the race 4 seconds ahead of FUN & GAMES (also with 39 minute handicap) but sailed the course 3 minutes 55 seconds faster and finished 8 places ahead. Despite recording her best result of the series LEBROK dropped one place in the aggregate into 4th place.

BARNSTORMER won start of the day with a 1 second start beating 3 yachts that started 2 seconds late for their handicaps. Twenty five yachts started within 10 seconds or less of their handicaps with only 4 yachts more than a minute late. The median start time for this race was 8 seconds compared with 11 seconds for the series.





The fleet started 53 minutes apart. Although no two yachts started at the same time, SUMMER WIND (Martin Sly) and TRUE COLOURS (P Akers & A West) started within 1 second of each other. At the completion of the first 3 legs of the race the fleet had reduced the gap to 25 minutes and 10 seconds. The gap increased a little in the remaining 3 legs of the race to 26 minutes 53 seconds. There wasn't a tie in this race but BLUE TACK (Andy Lynch) crossed the line 1 second ahead of FUN & GAMES and the same margin separated PIZAZZ (P.Martyn & R.Kemp) from MYUNA III (Geoffrey Nixon).



WW Summer Series 2016-17 Race 7 Elapsed Time




The average elapsed time of 2:07:15 was the longest so far this series. The range was 55 minutes 16 seconds, about 2 minutes greater than the range of handicaps. FOGGY DEW (Frank Hilliard) and PIZAZZ sailed the course in the same elapsed time but had handicaps of 20 and 27 minutes respectively. BARNSTORMER sailed the course 2 seconds faster than CARPE DIEM the latter having a handicap of 51 minutes compared with 46 minutes for BARNSTORMER, Two seconds was also the difference in elapsed time between MARIBEL and SUMMER WIND whose handicaps were 21 and 32 minutes respectively.

Race 7 is a little more than 25% of the scheduled 25 race summer series. Six of the seven races have been completed and the best 3 results recorded by each yacht contribute to the aggregate score. There is currently a tie for top place between SALTSHAKER (Ken Gayler) and PIPPA (Jeffrey Woolhouse) both with 9 points. At a similar stage of the 2016 Winter Series PIPPA led the series with a total of 10 points. A chart showing the points score for yachts in the current series is shown on the following page.



When you are winning the series you can afford to take a more relaxed approach to your sailing. On the other hand, maybe it is a result of a happy 50 years of marriage.
