

Wednesday Wonders Race 18 Winter Series 2017 (2/8/2017)

A record race for female skippers. Race 18 will be remembered by at least 2 women for their best results. Sm214 BLUE TACK was first to cross the finish line at 16:23:40. This was just under 2 mins in front of second. She started 29th off 42mins and was 11 seconds late. By No 4 she was 19th and in the next 37 mins led the fleet across the line. Andrew will need to buy a wide angle (or is it angel?) lens if he is going to capture Karen's winning smile. I am not sure that the handicapper is pleased with Blue Tack's score of a 1st, 2nd and 3rd in this series...so I won't mention it. I think there should be a least one coloured yacht in the top ten just to prove the club does not discriminate against women coloured yachts.

Second place for Sm367 LEBROK was a celebration for Theo Korbel, who returned to Wednesday Wonders after a short break. I think Theo's return also meant that Lebrok flew its newer sails.





Third, just over a minute later, was Sm701 SYC MELTEMI, her best place since a 4th in race 14. After starting 20th off 30mins, she lost 24 seconds at the start but she made her move early and was 7th around No 4 just 6 mins off first. At the shortened finish she had reduced this time to just 3:1mins

The second female skipper to score her best result since a first in Race 5 in the summer series, was MIDNIGHT MAGIC. She crossed the start line 20 seconds late after a 1 min handicap, and trying to sort out the AP flags and the revised timing. Midnight finished 11th just 8 ½ mins behind Blue Tack and 14 seconds behind FOGGY DEW. M&M is 37th in the winter series.



Some would have liked a 10 added to Course 8 to make Course 18 which has short legs. The race was a bit too close to not getting finished due to the time expiring, but thanks to 8 yachts who finished before 4:30, the whole fleet was able to cross the line and complete the race within the time limit.

Just one yacht did not score a result. BRANNEW misjudged her run along the start line and, avoiding other yachts who were starting, managed to score a record early start of 9:48mins which earned her a DNS.

Some of the early print outs from race 18 were not quite correct. BON VIVANT was recorded as a DNF. This may not seem a large error but adjusting Bon Vivant to the correct score meant that Russell Keays will fly the yellow flag for Race 19 as the leader of the series. She was equal 14th scoring 14.5. Russell has only had one podium but two 4th places.

Mark suggests that being a smaller yacht, if she was painted a bright colour she would be more easily distinguished.



Second place in the series, just ½ a point behind, is WHITE NOISE who scored another 9th place, (ie two 9ths in a row). She has an average of finishing 8th. CASSANDRA has slipped into 3rd place just 5 points away from first with a 24th this race that contributed to her score.

Getting a mention by Mark in these reports does have one draw back as Mark was reminded by the handicapper that some yachts who are doing well are upsetting his aim that "every yacht should have a chance at finishing last."

Notes to help you: The first yacht passed No 4 at 15:19:56, and the 10th at 15:27:49.

At the start of the race the yachts were spread 1hr:01min

At Number 4 the spread was 28:50 mins.

At the finish line the fleet was spread over 31:19 mins (I think this figure in theory should be smaller)

Mark wonders:

* Should late starts give the option to the Officer of the Day to adjust the finish time and provide a better chance to complete a race.

* If the OD can change the start time why not the finish time? They have access to the BOM etc. to check if conditions are suitable.

* Should short legs be used for light days. Not all sailors are tall!

* Do WW really enjoy sailing long legs that do not require the crew to do much and reduce down the number of decisions skippers have to make about sailing?



In these conditions you should watch out for whirlwinds and whirl pools. Guess which boat had whirlpools?
